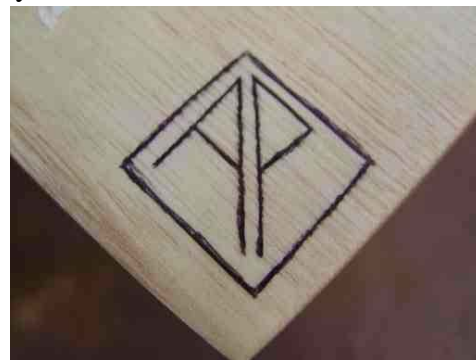

lesson and although she progressed, I could see that the board had to be changed. I saw her a few weeks later on a new board, and she was ripping. By riding her board....and walking in her shoes...I was better prepared to teach her what she needed to know."

NSSIA Director Kali Montero expanded his free surfing lessons to Surf World and Ocean Magic Surf Shop. He is already doing the lessons with Island water Sports

They are the only NSSIA accredited school in their area. Holden Beach is a little out of the way, 28 miles from the South Carolina border, about 45 minutes south of Wilmington, NC and 40 minutes north of Myrtle Beach, SC. Their location makes them ideal for surf seekers from many areas and they get a large crowd of tourists to their area during the summer months.
